She continued to check on the small wound but was concerned to see that the swelling around the area was growing.

Annaly took Lola to a veterinarian who said the that wound would heal by itself. But as the days passed the wound continued to grow into a large mass. Annaly took Lola to a second veterinarian who after probing the site on her head said that Lola would need very expensive treatment.

Fortunately, a friend suggested that she take Lola to People for Animals. Our Wellness Veterinarians immediately began treatment on Lola's wound but found it to be resistant to treatment. As soon as this was discovered surgery was recommended. Annaly was relieved to hear that the surgery would be at a price that she could afford. Annaly was



confident that Lola was comfortable and being well cared for at PFA.

PFA's medical director Dr. Croman performed the surgery to remove the mass and was very careful to hide the incision inside the natural fold of Lola's lovely face. Just two weeks later the wound was completely healed! A biopsy revealed that the mass was benign and Lola's fur has grown back. Annaly said, "It's amazing you can't even see a scar it was so well done! Dr. Croman keeps in

touch to make sure that Lola is doing well!" Thanks to PFA Lola will be spending the holidays healthy and happy at home!

I served as a bilingual phone caller helping people schedule appointments for vaccinations and/or spay or neuter surgeries for their dogs and cats. I also served as an interpreter for some of the pet parents on Sunday afternoon. From the moment I arrived, I was deeply impressed by the warmth and cooperative spirit of PFA's well organized team. Staff from all three clinics and volunteers worked together as a cohesive and happy team.

The pet parents, who had been in line at the close of the October 2nd vaccination blitz and returned for their appointments, impressed me with their commitment to and their interest in learning how to provide the best care for their pets. PFA is offering an essential service in Cumberland County where so many people are in need of affordable care for their pets. 717 pets treated in Cumberland County

Our pets need us, and we need them! Animals are important to us and we consider them part of our families. PFA's new **Whole Families Program** embraces this reality to better serve New Jersey pets and families.

We launched our **Whole Families Program** in the summer of 2021 in Cumberland County with free vaccination events in Millville, Vineland and Bridgeton. Over the course of the three events, a total of 557 cats and dogs were microchipped, vaccinated against rabies and distemper, and were offered to schedule a free spay/neuter at our Millville Clinic. But we didn't stop there.



The **Whole Families Program** is built on a One Health platform and views the pet as an integral and bonded family member. At our events, families were surveyed by staff and volunteers to

identify at-risk families facing challenges like housing or food insecurity, domestic violence, or mental health issues. PFA's licensed social worker, Lori McGahan, then followed up with each family-in-need to connect them with human services agencies that provide support with their challenges. Enabling early intervention and support for the whole family improves the outcome for all members of the family!



The success of these events led to a need to expand our capacity for spay/ neuter. Our services are so much in demand that our schedules are full so we had to find a way to get all of these pets spayed/neutered. The impromptu fourth and final event in Cumberland County brought 160 pet cats and dogs to our November weekend Spay-A-Thon! Hardworking staff and volunteers from all three of our clinics sacrificed their weekend off, coming together in Millville to provide free vaccines, microchips, and spay/neuter surgeries as well as pet food and supplies to families in need.

Our efforts were rewarded by the overwhelming gratitude we received from each and every pet and their families. Though our bodies were tired and muscles were sore by Sunday evening, our hearts were full knowing how many people and pets now have brighter days ahead, and can stay TOGETHER!

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- To prevent hypothermia or frostbite take shorter walks and avoid walking on ice and snow.
- Use a sweater or a coat for your pets to keep them warm.
- It's getting dark early so use a reflective leash and collar.
- Snow can make it difficult for your pet to find their way home. Make sure they have up to date contact information on their collar and they are microchipped.
- Wipe off your dog's paws when you get home to remove any salt or antifreeze.
- Animals can take shelter in vehicles. Bang on your hood or honk the horn before starting your vehicle to give them a chance to safely escape.
